A MESSAGE FROM GORD

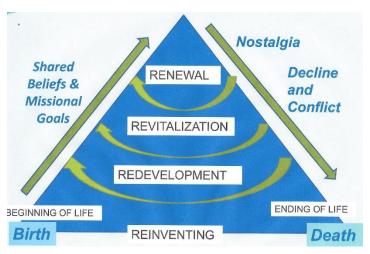
VISION LEADS RENEWAL

It is an amazing and a profound gift to be part of this community of faith we call Kincardine United Church. There is a vibrant desire to make a difference for the people of the congregation, but also to make a difference in the community around us. I believe we carry a vision that empowers our ministry and our mission. While we may not articulate that vision – yet – in a brief, memorable phrase, we continue to live into what gives us life and purpose.

Indeed, vision is the fuel or energy that drives our congregation into the future with hope and with a sense of potency. Our vision reflects the core values of our congregation. Our vision is lived out through healthy relationships - how we in the congregation attract new people into the journey of faith while helping each person deepen and mature their faith by nurturing relationships within the church community. To foster those relationships, our programmes, ministries and activities – which embody the vision of the church – also reflect the gifts and vocations of each of us. Effective programmes meet real, identified spiritual, social and emotional needs of *people in the neighbourhood* as well as of each of us within our community of faith.

Over the past year, Kincardine United Church actively examined how to live into our vision. We hosted a number of town hall meetings after church to decide on a Strategic Plan which would guide our ministry and mission to the end of 2020. I was so impressed with the wise and informed feedback, the careful and faithful discussions which took place and the eagerly positive approach everyone took. My impression is that in the back of the mind of many was the worry that we were declining.

Consider the diagram to the right about the life cycle of communities of faith. None of us wants our church to die, for there is so much we value about our ministry and our mission. A healthy church dreams a kin-dom dream which is, in short, the dream of right relations given to us by Jesus. If we have that dream, no matter where we are on the life cycle, whether on an upward slope, on a plateau or on a

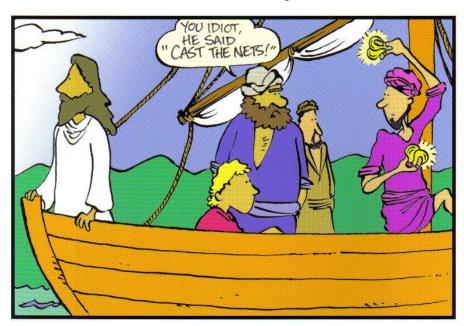


downward slope, whether we are in need of renewal, revitalization, or redevelopment, the common factor for health and for transformation is vision.

I believe that our Strategic Plan is helping, and will help, to provide a map for renewal over the coming two years. Because last year we decided to embrace our vision through this plan, we continue to take up the life-giving challenge of growing into the community of faith God calls us to be. Our Strategic Plan has two Goals which builds on two of the strengths we already have within our congregation:

- **A. Stirring, Helpful Worship** where we will weave into our worship services feedback from the congregation through town halls, surveys and spontaneous feedback.
- **B. Significant Relational Groupings** where we will grow the number of groups while weaving into our groups fruitful and safe ways of connecting one with each other.

It is this kind of forward gaze which inspires me. For example, we have been blessed with a growing variety of worship experiences, including Kerry Stover's skilled leadership as Intern Minister, the volunteer leadership of trained Licensed Lay Worship Leaders along with others willing to dare, the addition of Services of Prayer in both the Iona and the Taizé traditions, drama in worship, special musical guests, mission Sundays and youth-led, youth-created, youth-centred worship (coming March 3rd). As well, we have been blessed by new groups forming in addition to the many other extant groups we have, including the studies led by Kerry Stover, the Sharing Meditation group, the Craft Group, the imminent return of the Questers group, the monthly Sundae Sunday, the Loaves and Fishes potluck, the coffee provided prior to worship, the monthly Stew/Soup potluck after worship, the Property Ministry which so ably keeps our facility running well, the Affirming group currently forming and a series of public forums. All of this sounds like we are guided well by our vision, continuing to become ever more a community of faith which looks within and without. What a gift! What a witness!



Simply put, I believe our vision is to create disciples who will engage each other and the world with the Good News. Let's keep casting the nets.

COUNCIL REPORT

2018 was a transition year for Kincardine United Church, aligning in many respects with the ongoing transition of the entire United Church. With oversight and leadership from Gord Dunbar, as well as town hall meetings with the congregation, Council progressed the strategic planning process begun in 2017. The process focuses on ways to build on our strengths as a congregation, with a primary goal of becoming a more open and welcoming community. This process now rests with the Programme Committee to progress this plan. Consistent with this goal of being more open & welcoming, Council endorsed the Membership & Mission Committee beginning the exploration process for becoming an affirming ministry.

In its role of providing oversight for memorial and designated donations, Council was pleased to maintain surveillance of the Project Wish List. There was comfort in seeing completion of several small projects in 2018, the most visible being the purchase of comfortable new choir chairs. Some larger projects awaiting additional donations should see fruition with a bit of faith & funding.

Although possibly sounding mundane or obvious, Council continued to provide oversight for the process of gleaning and preserving the congregation's corporate knowledge, another process begun in 2017. Our first set of task instructions were issued: the purpose of these instructions is to preserve knowledge in a location accessible to all who might need to undertake any of these tasks but not necessarily have the knowledge to do so. Council also approved new or updated policies on facilities usage, membership, wedding and funeral policies & fees, computer & information technology, email and internet usage, and meetings held via email.

With respect to Council membership, there have been passages. Marion Boyd did not seek reelection as Council President but, not being the retiring type, continued with a full slate of presbytery pastoral relations work and was a commissioner to General Council 43. Jackie Clements retired from the Programme Committee after several years of faithful service, to be replaced on Council by the capable Judy Zarubick. We also welcomed Angela Hazlewood as our Council Secretary, and Kerry Stover as our intern minister.

2018 was a year of transition for the entire United Church. But how does this affect us, I hear some folk ask? In United Church polity, Council is the first level of church governance. With the Remits approved by General Council 43 (July 2018), Regional Councils replace Conferences and Presbyteries as of January 1, 2019. With fewer staff and resources at the Regional Council, communities of faith will have added responsibilities and will need to live into the structural and resource changes, learning to walk as partners with the Western Ontario Waterways (WOW) Regional Council in a new covenant relationship.

Kincardine United Church has long been a faithful supporter of Bruce Presbytery, with Council members Marion Boyd, Liz Dillman, Gord Dunbar, Emily Perry & myself serving in various roles in recent years; we are equally fortunate to have good representation on the new regional council which replaces Bruce Presbytery & Hamilton Conference, with both Gord Dunbar & myself serving on the transition commission establishing the new regional council. WOW, indeed!

The last pastoral oversight visit by Bruce Presbytery occurred in early September 2018. The visitation team met with Gord Dunbar, the Ministry & Personnel Committee, and members of the congregation to review our joys & strengths, hopes and concerns. Their report concluded with the statement, "It is a joy to see them moving into a position of rebuilding their mandate and living out God's purpose and direction for them". Amen!

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

2018 was a busy year for the Administration Committee, especially for the Property Ministry Team. In January, we welcomed John Phillips, our new Envelope Steward, and in September, we welcomed Kerry Stover, our new Intern Minister, to our meetings.

FINANCIAL BUSINESS

Thanks to those who counted and banked our weekly offering. Our monthly offering totals were higher than the 5-year overall average, thanks to the generosity of our congregation. However, expenses still exceeded our revenue and in October, we had to borrow \$25,000. Other financial information may be found in the 2018 Financial Report included in this Annual Report. In keeping with the Privacy Act, the detailed items for the Ministry and Personnel Committee will no longer be shown on Financial Statements, only the final totals. Also the Committee approved a new format for the Treasurer's Report, showing totals only for Revenue and Committee Disbursements. The detailed report is available in the office.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS:

- Celebration of Life Hymn Sing on May 27, 22 sponsors, raised \$1710
- Created a policy for the Boston Pizza Program
- Approved the revised Treasurer's Job Description prepared by Liz Dillman
- Upgraded the computer system in the small office to dual monitors
- Set up the computer, which was donated to us, in the Library area
- Purchased a new freezer for the kitchen
- Completed the annual Staff Evaluation Forms created by M&P Committee
- Purchased two lamps for use in the choir room or the chapel
- Sent a request to the Municipality for another handicapped parking spot, north of the current one awaiting a reply on this request
- Obtained approval from congregation to apply for grants from Trillium Foundation
- The Envelope Steward is now using the Power Church Computer Program which has many features useful to the workings of our church

PROPERTY MINISTRY HIGHLIGHTS

- Doors on the upper floor washrooms were reversed and now open outward;
 adjacent walls were repaired and painted
- Spring Work Bee and lunch, May 24
- Arranged for the cleaning of the carpet in Fellowship Hall
- Cleaned basement storage room, moved seasonal items to balcony storage room
- Cleaned and reorganized the Electrical Room
- Replaced the timer for the outside light
- Repaired the outdoor light that shines on the front of the building and the cross
- Checked fire extinguishers and EXIT lights regularly
- Installed acrylic glass in the doors of the display case
- Replaced the dehumidifier in the Fellowship Hall
- Completed many electrical projects

February – Pancake Supper was well attended. Rod Coates provided a membership policy for the difficult job of maintaining the membership roll. M&M recommended that this policy be adopted. Jean Johnson took on the role of Membership Steward. Jean & Sarah MacKenzie will work with Gord and Gerry McLeod regarding the Power Church program, used to keep track of members and KUC historic roll.

March – New members joined KUC: Julia and Stuart Metzger, Randy and Joan Norris, Charlie Clarke and Becky Vance. Congregational members ordered new plastic name tags at cost of \$5 (M&M pays additional \$2/tag). Janice Mason, from Saugeen, has a name of a family we will sponsor so they may attend the Native Peoples Retreat.

April – Easter Potluck Breakfast was a success.

May – Bernd removed the old name tag board. New, fair trade "Mountain View Coffee", was tried out and enjoyed during coffee time. Pre-church service coffee continues to be available upstairs.

June – Confirmation Sunday welcomed: Greg Hartwick, Lydia Ritchie, Lauren Williams and Nathan Williams. The Truth & Reconciliation Event (Blanket Exercise), a community event, was led by Joyce Johnston. The Church Picnic was enjoyed as Edenfolk entertained but no games due to the weather. We had a new KUC banner that was shown in the Kincardine Pride Parade.

July - "Sundaes for Sunday", a delicious idea, began and will continue the 1st Sunday every month.

September – We welcomed Kerry Stover, our new intern minister. Mission Sunday speaker David Epp spoke on Canadian Food Grains Bank. Gord and Liz delivered glasses and designated monies to Cape Croker. M&M made a motion to Council to begin the process of becoming an affirming church.

November – Michael Coren spoke about his book, <u>Epiphany: A Christian's change of heart and</u> mind over same sex Marriage.

December – A creche display was organized by Krista and congregational members could display their own on 2 Sundays this month. White Gift Sunday enabled Ursula and Bernd Portz to deliver many gifts to Cape Croker The 12-member Visiting Team delivered 20 poinsettias plus cards made by the Sunday School to people connected to KUC who were not always able to attend church. A vigil for women victims of violence was supported by KUC.

Several donations were made this year to: The Friends of the Observer, Kincardine Ministerial Benevolent Fund, Camp Support, Canadian Food Grains Bank, and the Grey Bruce Chaplaincy Fund.

M&M continues to provide coffee, tea, juice to be used by committees and before and after church. The M&M Committee meets the 3rd Tuesday of the month at various locations, where the chair and secretary jobs rotate through the membership. New members are always welcome!

We are always looking for volunteers to care for our youngest worshippers.

The House Ministry Team is represented on the Programme Committee by Sheila Bauer who has worked tirelessly this year to fill in the gaps. The Programme Committee recognizes that much work needs to be done with this ministry as there have been significant vacancies in 2018.

The Sacrament Guild has been overseen by Marion Brown. Our library, found in the Resource Room, continues to be overseen by Mildred Clayton.

David Hamilton arranged for Dent Davidson to once again come and provide a music workshop for choirs in the area. It was well attended and much appreciated. David Hamilton also arranged for guest musicians throughout the year from inside and outside of our congregation.

We welcomed an Intern, Kerry Stover, in September as he began his Supervised Ministry Education with Rev. Gord Dunbar as Supervisor, and a Lay Supervision Team of Liz Dillman, Wally Jirgens, Berndt Portz and Angelwood Hazlewood.

The Programme Committee also: finds pulpit supply for vacation and study leaves, oversees a worship calendar, decorates the sanctuary for special services such as Christmas, Thanksgiving, and Easter; and provides carnations on Mother's Day and Dad's Cookies on Father's Day.

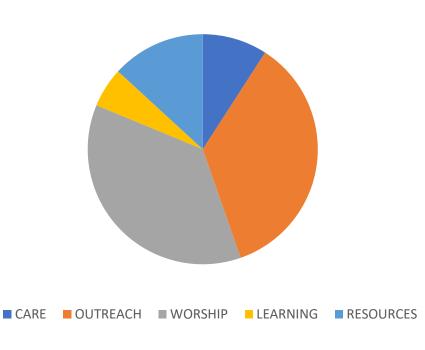

KINCARDINE UNITED CHURCH 2019 BUDGET CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SUNDAY, DECEMBER 9th, 2018

The congregation of Kincardine United Church was called to meet in the sanctuary on Sunday, December 9th, 2018, following the morning worship service, to approve the 2019 budget. Approximately 60 persons were in attendance.

1. Call to Order and Constitution of the Meeting

Rod Coates called the meeting to order at 11:45 AM, stating that notice of the meeting had been duly given for the sole purpose of reviewing and approving the 2019 budget.

2. **Opening Prayer**

Gord Dunbar opened the meeting with a prayer.

3. Behavioural Covenant

Those present read the Kincardine United Church Behavioural Covenant.

4. **Enabling Motions**

Rod Coates presented the enabling motions.

5. 2018 Financial Report and Budget for 2019

Jack Nancekivell introduced the chairs of each committee to speak specifically about their budgets. Mary Phillips spoke about the Mission and Personnel budget. She mentioned the suggested wage increases that this committee recommends. (She also asked Gord Dunbar and Kerry Stover to remove themselves for this portion of the report).

- -1.6% increase for the minister per the United Church of Canada
- -2.2% for the organist as per the Royal Canadian College of Organists
- -Increases to the office coordinator and custodian to bring their salaries to living wages.

Jack Nancekivell proceeded to invite Judy Zarubick as chair of the Programme Committee to speak. She talked about removing \$5,000 from their budget as Dent Davidson is not available to offer a workshop in 2019. Judy Zarubick continued to say that the Programme Committee is under budget because many of the items needed were paid for through donations such as the new monitors in the nursery and the kitchen. The committee would like their budget to be \$10,600 instead of \$15,600 as printed in the income statement. If they decide to offer a workshop they would go to Council to make a request for the dollars. Barry Schmidt asked if the choir workshop could be offered by someone in the community. Judy Zarubick stated that this could go to David Hamilton and the choir to discuss.

Bernd Portz asked why the budget for confirmation was moved to Membership and Mission. Judy explained that first step in membership is confirmation, so it makes sense for Membership and Mission to take over the budget for this sacrament.

Jack Nancekivell went on to introduce Donna Mowry as the chair of the Administration (Property and Finance) Committee. Donna Mowry explained that this committee is about heat, lights, water, repairs, taxes, and insurance which are items we must pay and have little control to change. She went on to state that the church is under budget as this has been a mild winter, but December is not included in the total and heat and water will have to be added on. Donna Mowry said that there was a lot of maintenance to be done this past year, but there were so many volunteers who not only offered their time, but donations were made for many of the supplies needed. In 2019, we really do not know what the heat bill will be as it will depend on what "mother nature" brings, Donna Mowry stated. Jack Nancekivell added that there will be major repairs in 2019 such as new dry wall which will be completed over the winter months. He went on to say that the much of the budget is for staff salaries and not to forget that \$45,000 was taken from our investments. He continued that 24.88% is what the inflation rate is and we are right in line with \$265,138 for expenses.

That the 2019 budget be approved as presented.

Barry Schmidt commented that if the church continues to take from their investments, the money will run out in 2 years. He stated that we need to increase our revenue by 22.9% either by individuals increasing their givings or by inviting new people into "our fold". Barry Schmidt praised Gord Dunbar for encouraging people moving up a "notch" with their individual givings and for new people attending our church to add to the revenue.

Jack Nanckevell asked Donna Mowry to speak about grants from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to help to increase the church's income. Donna Mowry gave the history of this foundation as follows: In 1982 the government created this foundation from lotteries to allow grants for sports, arts and culture, and the environment. Since the money was from lotteries, the United Church of Canada would not allow individual churches to apply for grants. This rule has since been lifted and churches can decide if they would like to apply for this grant. Donna Mowry stated that from her research, she found that some churches have used the money to repair parking lots, set up bands, or make repairs to heritage buildings, for example. She went on to say that it would be wonderful to have our wish list items completed sooner.
